Boost your immunity this winter

This winter, most adults and children will be eligible for a flu jab, a Covid-19 vaccination and/or a booster. These free vaccinations are the most effective way to boost your natural immunity and protect yourself, your family and community from these viruses.

Dr Oisin Brannick, GP at North Kensington's Exmoor Surgery, said:

"Looking after our health during winter is really important. This year, both flu and Covid-19 are in circulation, meaning that it's essential for everyone to take the vaccinations that are on offer to them.

"This will help to prevent the serious impact that these viruses can have and also help to reduce their spread."

You will be contacted by letter or text to let you know which vaccines are available to you. You can get your flu jab from your GP or many pharmacies. You can also pay for a flu jab at pharmacies if you're not eligible for the free vaccination through the NHS.

Book your vaccine appointments, boost your immunity and stay well this winter. There's additional support on staying well available for those living in North Kensington who have been affected by the Grenfell tragedy. Find out more at: www.grenfell.nhs.uk



Borough welcomes Afghan evacuees

Vacuees staying in the borough after leaving Afghanistan have been receiving dedicated help from a team set up by Kensington and Chelsea Council.

The Refugee Support Team was created in September and has worked with other agencies to provide on-the-ground assistance at hotels in the borough.

Educational support has been rolled out, with school places

provided to 150 primary and 90 secondary-aged children, and the Council has also made four good-quality mews houses available for evacuee families.

One Afghan national who arrived from Kabul at the end of August said:

"For now we are here and the Council is doing everything to help us, starting with clothes, food and other things. They are thinking about everything and we appreciate that."

High-tech filters cut care home Covid risk

esidents in Kensington and Chelsea care homes are being protected from airborne viruses thanks to the installation of cutting-edge air filters.

The High-Efficiency Particulate Air purification units, which have been fitted in 14 locations in the borough and neighbouring Westminster, reduce the risk of residents catching Covid-19, flu and other existing and emerging viruses.

The units were purchased following specialist air quality surveys commissioned by the councils and carried out in care homes in May 2021. The results recommended developing air quality hazard control plans, looking at ways to improve natural ventilation and creating clean air zones.

Zoe Smith, registered manager at Elesmere House, one of the first care homes in the borough to receive a purifier, said: "I feel reassured that we are able to provide air purifiers, knowing that we are doing everything we possibly can to protect our residents, staff and visitors from catching Covid-19, flu and other airborne viruses."



Noisy drivers targeted in acoustic camera expansion

Noisy and nuisance drivers could soon face fines anywhere in Kensington and Chelsea, after residents overwhelmingly supported a boroughwide crackdown.

After piloting cutting edge acoustic camera technology last year in Knightsbridge, the Council has issued fines to 144 drivers caught racing or revving on Sloane Street and Pont Street.

A Public Space Protection Order, currently only existing in

Knightsbridge, has now been expanded to allow officers to enforce against anti-social driving from Kensal Road in North Kensington to the Chelsea Embankment.

Prairie Garden boosts biodiversity

A new 'Prairie Garden' has been planted on North Kensington's Lancaster West Estate to boost biodiversity in the area.

The garden sits on the green space between Hurstway and Testerton Walk and is a partnership between Kensington and Chelsea Council, Grow2Know and The Natural History Museum's Urban Nature project.

The garden is full of grasses and perennials which return year after year, are resilient against challenging weather and attract wildlife. The Prairie Garden will also act as a pollinator hotspot for our Bee Superhighway and improve the biodiversity of the area.

Your views will help decide how we provide affordable housing for those who can't afford to rent or buy on the open market but who don't qualify for a social home, including key workers.

The consultation will also seek to identify how the Council's limited stock of housing should be allocated, which roles should be considered as key workers and whether priority should be given to those currently living out of the borough.

It follows a successful Key Worker Pilot Scheme in 2020 which saw more than 325 people express their interest in 14 flats in North Kensington, which were targeted at those working locally in the NHS and education sectors.

New homes programme gathers pace

Plans submitted for Barlby Road homes

🗖 lans for 83 new homes on Barlby Road in North Kensington have been submitted to the Council's Planning department.

The proposals, which are part of Phase Two of the programme to provide 600 new homes in the borough, include 38 social rent homes, four intermediate or key worker rental properties and 41 which will be available on the open market.

The development will also provide an indoor sports facility, an upgraded and enlarged community garden and an extension to a neighbouring NHS dental practice.

Once validated, the plans will be visible on the Council's planning application page www.rbkc.gov. uk/planning/searches where residents will be able to comment formally.

Work underway on more new homes

onstruction of 20 new homes for local residents on another of the Council's Phase One New Homes Programme sites has begun at Hewer Street in North Kensington.

Half of the homes in the development, opposite St Charles Hospital, will be offered at intermediate rent available to key workers. The first residents should be able to move in before the end of 2022 and all the new homes within the project will remain in Council ownership.

The news follows the first spade going into the ground at nearby Kensal Road in July, with 37 new homes due to be completed - 27 for social rent with the remaining 10 offered at intermediate rent.

Voluntary sector receives more than £2.8 million

his autumn, we launched our Voluntary Sector Support Fund (VSSF), providing over £2.8 million in funding to 35 local organisations including Chelsea Theatre, Kids On The Green, Kensington and Chelsea Forum and more.

Through the fund, organisations get access to financial backing under an 18-month commitment to make sure we provide ample opportunity for new, helpful third sector organisations to apply for financial support.

The successor to the Corporate Grants Scheme, the VSSF core funding that will take the strain off of them financially, and allow them to focus on services for the community.

The Chelsea Theatre is using VSSF funding to provide space for the likes of Age UK, Open Age, London Sports Trust and more and to run a café offering subsidised food and drink and creative classes.

Chelsea Theatre General Manager Paul Adlam said:

"It's wonderful to be a recipient of the VSSF grant and we will continue to grow with our diverse community, providing a place of comfort and artistic expression for those who need it."
